Apple has updated its premium In-Ear Headphones, replacing the rubber 3.5 mm headphone plug casing with a hard plastic one. The premium upgrade features three different sizes of ear tips and a carrying case for the tips and headphones. It should be noted that the premium upgrade's volume buttons do not work with the original iPhone or iPhone 3G.


iTunes Store to sell 4 billion songs in 2009

The iTunes Store has sold eight billion songs since launch in mid-2003 and is projected to sell four billion this year alone. Between Jan 6, 2009 and July 21, 2009 the service sold 2 billion songs, which is interesting when you consider it took Apple between April 28 2003 and January 10, 2007 to sell the first two billion.



App Store is booming

The Apple app store hit 1.5 billion downloads in its first year, and now offers more than 65,000 apps. An average of 135 new apps are submitted every day. There were 1,630 submissions in August 2008 and 8,762 in June 2009. The average price of an app is \$2.57, which includes both the 12,754 free apps and the most expensive app (a video surveillance program called iRa at \$899.99). The most popular category in the store is games, with 10,346, followed by Entertainment (7,852) and Books (7,564). There are 9097 finance programs, 663 medical apps, 306 weather applications, and at least 50 fart apps. If you wanted to buy every app in the U.S. store today, it would cost you \$145,885.87.



Kodak unveils 1080p camcorder

The Kodak Zi8 (\$180) is one of the first pocket camcorders to record at 1080p. It can capture 1920x1080 at 30 frames per second, producing movies that show at a full Blu-ray movie resolution. It can also

touch into a bedside clock and provide users with weather information. Users can select from one of three views for the clock display, which can be set to dim if desired. Its release date hasn't been specified.


