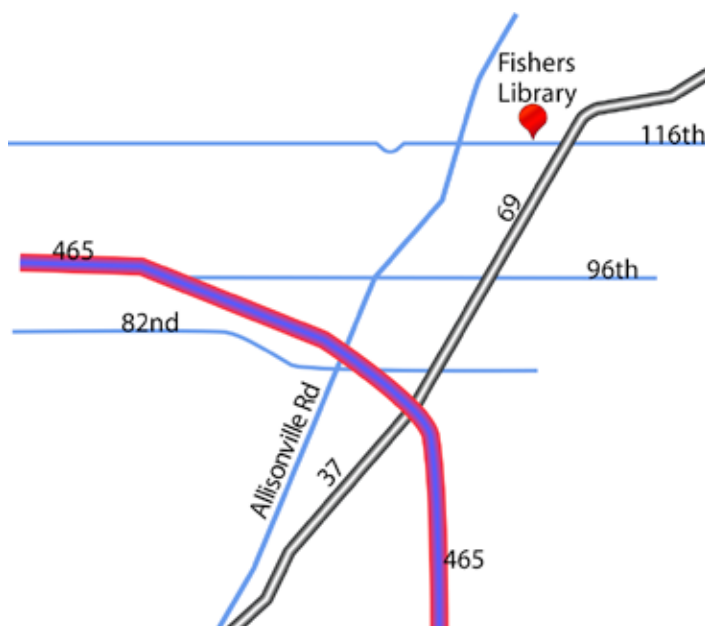

# Review: DYMO Labelwriter® 450

If you are looking for an easy way to create labels and bypass standard word processors in the process, check out the Dymo LabelWriter® 450: Professional Label Printer.

If you are frustrated trying to create labels in programs such as *Pages*, *MS Word* or similar applications, you could benefit from the LabelWriter® 450. The labels for this printer come in rolls made by Dymo. Whenever you need a label, just go to the Dymo app and print out your label. (See attached screen dump).

## Options

Like most word processors, the Dymo app offers varied choices for your labels: fonts, size, clip art, alignment, style, etc. You get a lot of flexibility. Want to add bold text, italics, and clip art from your Mac? It's all within the scope of this program.

You can print labels from within *MS Word*, the Mac *Address Book*, etc. as well. You can select from 60 label layouts and add your own graphics

Just load a roll of labels and you're set to go. A starter set of 130 labels comes with the 450. Prices can be steep, however, when comparing print costs with a laser or inkjet printer.

## Print Costs

An inkjet/laser printer uses 8-1/2" x 11" label sheets, which can cost between \$15 and \$25 for a package of 3,000 labels of 100 sheets (30 per sheet). Compare this figure to Dymo label rolls



As you can see the Dymo LabelWriter® 450, while convenient, can be super expensive compared to other standard printers.

One factor overlooked in these numbers is that the 450 uses thermal imaging rolls which only require heat and no ink cartridges. So you would be saving the cartridge expense.

## Installation

The install of this Dymo printer was quick and straightforward. The printer comes with a Mac-compatible CD-ROM. You just need to run it and you will immediately find the Dymo printer within your *Print and Fax* section of *System Preferences*. Note that there was a later version of the software online than what was on the CD-ROM.

After downloading the software, just add the included USB cable.

## Features

**Resolution and Speed** – The LabelWriter® 450 has a resolution of 300 dpi (dots-per-inch) and prints up to 51 labels per minute. These two factors results in a graphics mode of 600 x 300 dpi.

**No ink or toner** - As mentioned above, this printer uses thermal technology to print on special thermal paper (much like a retail receipt) and as a consequence has no cartridge costs.

**Size** - Its small size (5" x 5.5" x 7" (WHD) takes up very little room on your desktop.

**Stamp Printing** – This printer will print stamp labels for letters or packages.

**Label Sizes** – 1-1/8"(address labels) to 2-1/2" widths (packaging labels)

## Postage Printing

One of the LabelWriter® 450's benefits is its ability to print postage stamps. While this is technically correct. There are some caveats that need to be addressed.

There are two programs to print stamps.

- 1) No Fee Program:** For a starter fee of \$49.99, you will receive special stamp software and 2 rolls of specially treated stamp rolls. You can then print out only standard stamps for letters or postcards.
- 2) Fee Program:** For \$15.95/mo (\$9.95/mo for PCs) you can print out stamps in any denomination for letters, packages (Parcel Post, Priority Mail, Media Mail, etc.) You still have to buy the special labels at a cost of 6-8 cents each.

Both of these programs seem to be especially pricey due to the extra fees incurred. A business with a large mail output could reap the savings of these extra costs, but a home situation with few mailings a week would find it costly.

## Conclusion

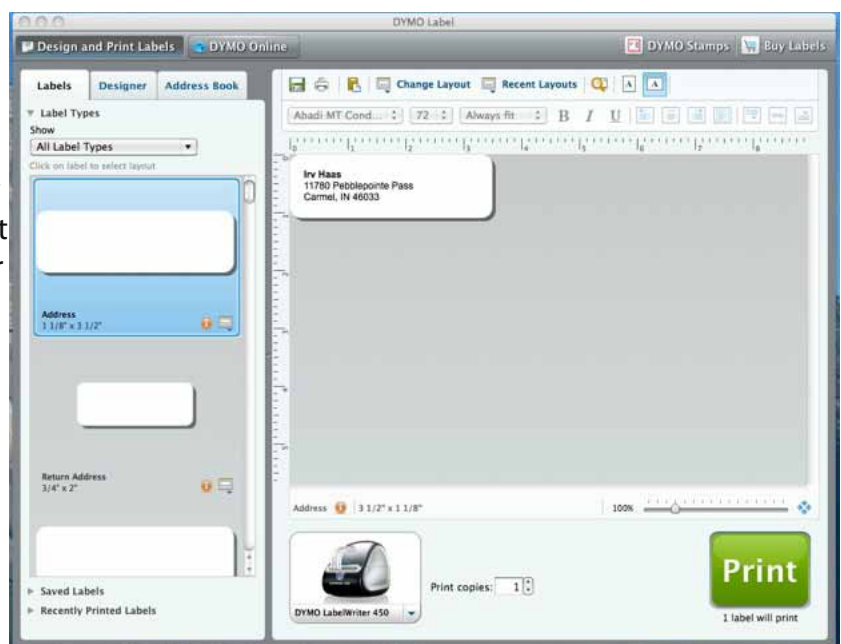
The LabelWriter® 450 is an easy to use and install device. Just open the app and print out the text (and graphics if desired) and this printer spits them out instantly. This printer is much like cell phone service.

List price of this printer is \$129.99, but discounts can be found around \$90. The hardware piece is priced extremely low; the incidental costs drive the price much higher

Nowhere is this conundrum found more than in its postage printing function. It works as advertised as long as you are aware of the extra charges involved.

Also, note that the printer does black printing only, although you can purchase color labels.

If you want a small footprint printer to expressly print out labels effortlessly, consider the Dymo LabelWriter® 450., but beware of the incidental charges as well.



# Updating Your GPS

Having just purchased a Garmin 1450 GPS, I wanted to make sure I had the latest mapping data. For that purpose, I visited Garmin's site and got my free download.

However, I noticed that there was a newer 2011 upgrade on their site. Unfortunately, the 2010 update was all that was offered at no charge. If I wanted newer data, I would have to pay for it.

If you've wanted to update your GPS in order to have more current mapping data, you have several options open to you each with their own pros and cons. These options are based on Garmin's options and may be applicable to other vendors as well.

The three main GPS manufacturers are Garmin, Magellan and TomTom. Of these three, only Garmin and Tom-Tom offer Mac compatibility. So if you want to update either the firmware or the mapping software, just connect your GPS to your Mac to upgrade these items. To date, Magellan does *not* offer Mac support.

## Option #1: One-time Map Update

This would seem to be the easiest solution for updating. Most GPS manufacturers offer a one-time upgrade option. If your GPS is a few years old and you recognize that there are new streets out there, you can do a one-time map update. For \$69.99 Garmin offers two options here, either a download from their site or a purchase of an update DVD. Be aware that the DVD purchase would also incur a shipping charge.

## Option #2: Lifetime Mapping Update

If you do much traveling and require frequent map updates, this could be your best option. For \$119.99,

Garmin offers lifetime updating (up to 4 times a year) done through downloading only.

Be warned that this lifetime update means the life of your physical GPS—not your lifetime. So if you purchase another GPS down the road, you would be required to buy another lifetime update; your existing lifetime update would be invalid on the new GPS.

Garmin offers very little assistance with this process. For your \$120, you get a credit-sized card with a website to locate and your *Product Key* exclusive to your purchase and no other information.

## Installing Your Update



Installing your update would seem to be a simple task, but it has its own problems. The primary problem is speed of downloading. For me, the file was 2.4GB and with a DSL speed of 2.5-3.0 mbps took 2 and 3/4 hours for the download to occur.

After this step is completed, you need to upload the data to your GPS, which is plugged into your

Mac with a mini-USB cable. It takes an additional 30 minutes for this upload. As you can see, the updating time is well over 3 hours!

Problems can arise with the downloading. Either option requires a *Product Key* that is an 8 digit alphanumeric code for validation. Upon completion of the download, you are requested for your **launch** *Product Key* in order to install the data on to your GPS.

When my *Product Key* did not work, I called Garmin for assistance. After nearly 30 minutes on hold, the technical support person informed me that I needed a second *Product Key* that was located in my Garmin account. Nowhere was this information located. If Garmin had

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# REVIEW: Seagate FreeAgent Theater + HD Media Player

Looking for a way to integrate your photos and videos into your TV? Check out the **Seagate FreeAgent Theater+ HD Media Player**.

This is a simple way to download those photos, movies and music from your Mac and play them on your TV. Just connect your network to this device and move those files on the FreeAgent Theater+ and then watch them on your set.

Seagate has included composite and analog video cables. Unfortunately, you need to supply your own HDMI cable if you plan on making connections to your HD set.

A remote has also been included to wirelessly control your media without having to be right in front of the unit itself.

Be aware that this media player has no hard drive. You can purchase Seagate's 500 GB portable hard drives for about \$100 each or buy a combo unit with the drive for \$200.

## Setup

Instead of a full instruction manual, Seagate has included a foldout Quick Start Guide to aid you in setting up this device. For more information, you can use the full PDF manual found on the CD.

Unfortunately, I was not able to test out this media player since the above instructions required you to hook up your Theater+ to your network and TV together. Since I have no network access on my TV (on another floor) this was not possible.

To make matters worse, this device is not wireless which would have overcome the problem noted above.

## Evaluation

The Seagate FreeAgent+ Theater seems to have all the components necessary to view your videos, music or photos on your TV. However, you still need to spend an extra \$100 to make this a complete workable unit. This player alone has a \$149.99 list, but can be purchased online for around \$100. Add in the hard drive, makes this a \$200 purchase. Are there less expensive units on the market that could do the same thing?



# Freshly Squeezed Reviews: Truly the Digital Video Shoebox

Whether you're a backyard Spielberg or a professional videographer, you inevitably accumulate a ton of footage to keep track of, be it for a single project or archiving. You could create several folders and, if you are archiving, .Zip them. But you're working on a computer! Shouldn't it be doing the work instead of you?

"Create and organize your video catalogue. iDive offers videographers, both professionals and amateur enthusiasts, the possibility of managing video footage collections. iDive transforms your videos into a catalog that's easy and quick to put together and access."

Does the application live up to its promise in a true production workflow?

## THE JUICE

With iDive v2, you first capture your digital footage and organize it by date and/or event. Just hook your camera to your Mac, launch iDive, click a few times and you're importing your footage.

Once captured, your footage is then logged. You can even catalogue your CDs and DVDs, not just memories from your camcorder tapes. You can even organize clips that you download from the internet, from sites such as YouTube. Think of it as a video iPhoto, in that sense.

As for cataloging, iDive works in many formats from the ubiquitous QuickTime to MPEG2 and AVCHD (it is also linked to Aquafadas' VideoPier, to read other

formats). You can navigate your libraries in either list or thumbnail mode. You can also set it to import your footage and separate it by scenes. This takes longer to perform but could save you a ton of time in post.

As for exporting, you can export your chosen footage to any Quicktime format from iPhone/iPod touch to Apple TV. You can save the thumbnails from throughout your clips as images. You can export directly to iMovie, Final Cut Express, Final Cut Pro, Avid and iPhoto.

## THE PULP

iDive v2 sports a new GUI which I found easy to use on the small real estate of my 13" MacBook Pro. I was able to access any library, view all relevant clip information, such as aspect ratio, clip duration, etc. Plus, there's even a small screen at the bottom of the pane to watch my clip. And, if I wish, I can switch it to full screen mode.

At first, I felt a little daunted when I launched the program. But their support is so thorough that I was able to answer my initial question in no time with their extensive .PDF file. After that, the interface led you through the steps effortlessly.

## THE RIND

Nada.

## SUMMARY

If you're going to be juggling any amount of footage, then you most definitely need to get iDive. And if you do any video work for a living or income, then Aquafadas' iDive will pay for itself within your first production. You don't have to waste your time (i.e., money) cataloguing your libraries or, more expensive yet, paying someone to do it for you.

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# REVIEW: Nikon Coolpix S3000 Digital Camera

If you have been looking for a compact camera with 12MP (megapixel) resolution, Nikon's EXPEED digital imaging technology, wide 4X optical zoom and advanced image stabilization features at a price that won't break the bank, check out the **Nikon Coolpix S3000 Digital Camera**, a new model for 2010.



This camera demonstrates how far camera technology has come in both features and pricing. This camera is a 12MP compact camera that measures only 3.5" (w) x 2.0" (h) x 1/2" (t). Although this camera retails for \$149.99, discounts can be found around \$140.

Its small size will amaze you. To call this a "pocket" camera is a misnomer. You could probably fit 3 of these cameras in many pockets! Is your camera only 1/2" thin?

## Basic Features

The MP resolution of 12 is amazing for a camera this small. Of course, this is not an important concern for most enthusiasts unless you are into making large prints. Nikon suggests this resolution will let you create prints as large as 16" x 20."

The LCD screen size of 2.7" is huge for a camera of this size. You won't have any problems viewing your images on this screen. The down side of all this is that for such a large screen, the control buttons are unusually small, especially for someone with big fingers. This camera uses a wide 4X optical zoom. However

when coupled with a NIKKOR glass lens, you get extremely sharp images.

## Memory

Like most digital camera, the S3000 uses memory cards to store photos. This Nikon uses the standard SD cards or the newer SDHC (High Capacity) cards for storing photos. The S3000 comes with 47MB of internal storage that will yield 2-18 photos depending on resolution.

With an SD card, you can expect up to 2210 photos on one 2GB card. With larger capacity SD cards, your number could go up even higher. The S3000 can take up to 32GB-size cards.

## Nikon's Technology Features

Nikon has provided a lot of technology into the S3000. Check out some of these technology features to prevent shooting errors:

- ✓ **EXPEED digital imaging technology** automatically controls the entire picture-taking operation from image capturing to processing
- ✓ **Image stabilizing features** compensates for the effects of camera shake. Its Motion Detection automatically controls shutter speed and other variables.
- ✓ **Scene Auto Selector** eliminates the need to manually select a scene mode to match the shot. (Night mode, sports mode, close up, mode, etc.)
- ✓ **Smart Portrait System** is Nikon's face-finding technology that automatically focuses on up to 12 faces in a group portrait.
- ✓ **Smile Mode** automatically releases the shutter when your subject smiles. No more blank looks from your subjects!

- ✓ **D-Lighting** rescues dark or backlit images by improving brightness and detail where needed.

### Color Choices

The trend these days is to bring out cameras in various colors, similar to the iPod nano choices!



Nikon has really overdone it this time. The S3000 comes in plum, black, blue, green, orange and grey.

Although these color choices may not be all that significant, you will find that the different colors have different prices as well depending on demand.

### Mac Support

This Nikon camera technically does not have drivers that work with Macs. However, it seemed to work well with iPhoto and instantly downloaded its photos without installing the included CD software.

If you feel you need support, Nikon includes their *Nikon Transfer* software program to move images from the camera directly into your Mac.

### Battery Options

The Nikon S3000 uses a new proprietary battery that is extremely thin to fit into this extremely thin camera. It is a Li-ion (EN-EL10) which measures 1-1/2" x 1" x 1/4"!

Don't plan on finding this battery at your local store. You can find it online between \$10-\$17 depending on whether it is a Nikon or generic.

### Evaluation

The pictures from the S3000 came out quite sharp and clear from such a compact camera. The flash impressively distributed light a good 10-12 feet away. However, shots without the flash demonstrated a fair amount of grain.

A point-and-shoot camera like the S3000 demonstrated weakness of other similar models when compared against an SLR like my current D3000, namely shutter lag and specific focusing issues.

### Negatives

All cameras have some shortcomings. You just need to find one you can live with.

A basic problem mentioned earlier is that the large 2.7" LCD screen reduces the button sizes on the rear of the camera. This could be a real problem for those with large hands and fingers.

Removing images is a simple task. With the Nikon S3000 just press the *trash* icon to remove your last image. Most other cameras offer you a *delete one* or *delete all* option.

The S3000 makes things more difficult. With this camera however, if you want to delete multiple images you have to get into the Playback Menu and then select *Delete One* or *Select All* before you delete



them. A simple option on the trash button to delete one or all would have eliminated this problem.

Another drawback is Nikon's omission of a viewing lens due to its small size. Yes, the camera has a nice 2.7-inch LCD, but with light changing, it would be nice to occasionally look through the viewfinder as well. I realize that Nikon like other camera manufacturers can save money by eliminating this feature.

### Manuals

To cut costs, Nikon has provided a 24-page Quick Start Guide to get you going with the S3000.



However, if you need more complete information, Nikon has included the full 184-page manual on a CD.

### What's Included?

Nikon has included the following items in the box:

- 1) Nikon S3000 Coolpix Digital Camera
- 2) AC Adapter/Charger
- 3) EN-EL10 Li-Ion Rechargeable Battery
- 4) USB Cable
- 5) Audio-Video Cable
- 6) Strap
- 7) Coolpix Software Suite CD-ROM (not needed with iPhoto)
- 8) User's Manual on CD-ROM

### Conclusion

The Nikon Coolpix S3000 Digital Camera is hard to beat for someone looking for a small digital camera to easily place in pocket or purse. The features of this camera, usually found in more expensive cameras, are an added bonus.

For under \$150, as a primary camera for someone new to digital photography or as a backup camera for an experienced photographer the S3000 is one serious contender.

# 6 Best Free Mac Video Converters

This article talks about a collection of free Mac video converters. Some of these weren't familiar to me.

## 1. HandBrake

Originally, a DVD ripping tool, has become more of a universal video converter with its most recent release. Now it can handle pretty much any format and change it to another one.

## 2. ffmpegX

ffmpegX is that it's based on a large collection of Unix tools wrapped in a simple drag and drop interface.

## 3. MPEG Streamclip

A is a drag and drop utility for exporting to a chosen video format.

## 4. Prism Video Converter

Is a simple to use converter that doesn't support as many formats, but has a simple interface.

## 5. iSquint

Is no longer under production, but has been turned into an open source project. It converts videos for iTunes.

## 6. FLV2iTunes

Can take a number of video formats and convert them into an iTunes-friendly codec. It can import video directly into iTunes.

included a specific update information sheet along with the "credit card" this call would not have been necessary. Overall, the update process took nearly 4 hours to complete! To avoid all of this, consider Option #3.

### Option #3: Buy a New GPS

Considering how much Garmin and other manufacturers charge for their map updating, buying a new GPS may be a more attractive solution.

GPS units have fallen in price dramatically over the last 3 years. Priced typically in the \$500-1000 range, they can now be found for \$100 with fully featured models around \$150.

One of the key benefits of a new GPS is that you are receiving a current map update at no additional charge.

### Conclusion

If you have a GPS and like the features on the unit, keep it and consider a map upgrade instead for much less than a new model. But if you have an older GPS, buying a 2010 model may be more attractive. Only you can decide which of these choices is best for you.
